

Disability support services in Australia are largely delivered through the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS).

Over 500,000 Australians with disability use the NDIS to access services for treatment, care and support to build independence. It allows them to develop new skills, maintain work, volunteer and improve their quality of life.

Disability support services are delivered in a range of settings including residential, supported living, community, day programs and in the home. Support can include physical and psychosocial support, community groups, sporting clubs, support groups, libraries and schools.

A highly skilled and professional workforce is the foundation of high-quality services in disability support. Career pathways include existing and emerging roles as a disability support worker, lived and living experience worker, peer work, specialised support and clinical roles, support navigation, technology specialist and more.
